The Society continues in their work to disrupt multiple disadvantages for young people.

Sexual Exploitation:

- Spotting the warning signs
- Assisting young people who are at risk or victims
- Helping them through the justice system

Help children access mental health support:

- Mental health provision is at crisis point and demand is increasing
- Teenagers are increasingly self-harming or resorting to suicide
- Provide stepping stone frontline services for those most at risk

Trafficking and refugees and criminal exploitation:

- Youngsters are used by drug gangs to travel outside of major cities to sell drugs often under threat of violence to them or their families.
- Society works with youngsters to empower them to say no and divert them from risk
- Assisting young refugees who are often alone and at risk.

Other areas of work include supporting young carers, missing children and substance misuse. Current lobbying campaigns to highlight awareness and obtain extra funding for young people's services, child and family poverty.


Earlier in the year tithed funds from the St Bartholomew's Reordering Appeal helped to fund the construction

of two toilet blocks with flushing toilets at Magnet School Rongata Ongai in Kenya. Prior to this the pupils only had unhygienic pit latrines available. This is such a great step forwards for the school. Jeremiah Kibobi (the school founder and principle) stated "A great change has been experienced in Magnet School. Glory to God".

Kenya suffered from drought this year and staple food prices were rising at an alarming rate . WWSL provided funding for the purchase of 3 months worth of food for the schools 300 pupils to alleviate the problem. Jeremiah has made some lasting contacts with two churches in the USA who have assisted with the construction of a new hen house and a canteen for the pupils who had been eating outside or in classrooms.

In Serbia BELhospice has developed a volunteer programme with a thriving team of trained volunteers who visit patients and assist with events. In Romania the help and enthusiasm of volunteers meant that in 2019 Hospices of Hope were able to run five summer trips for children and their carers. Scripture Union – South East News

Scripture Union Was set up in 1918

and each year a team have gathered to bring an impact to the local community by sharing the love of Jesus in different ways. There has been a huge legacy of serving and sharing the good news of Jesus. But as you can imagine Felpham has changed over the 100+ years since the first mission began. Felpham now neighbours a Butlins site in Bognor, a popular holiday destination for many, and in recent years, housing redevelopment projects have seen a number of neighbouring communities grow. Building on the faithful service of many in the past, a new team leader is stepping up to take the lead. The Rev. Dan Balsdon is a local Methodist minister serving three of the local Methodist churches in the area. Dan has brought together a team of people to help coordinate the mission week for 2020 - seeking to grow and build on all the foundations that have been laid in the past century. Impact 2020 will run from 27th -31st July. Currently the team are busy working on a programme that will include a morning holiday club, family events, youth events and of course the classic tide battle at the beach.



Far Eastern Broadcasting Association – FEBA

Broadcasting from the port town of Pemba in north Mozambique, Radio Wimbe is playing an important role as a Christian FM community radio station in an area marked by sharp contrasts. Over 60% of the people in this region are Muslim, which is markedly different to the rest of Mozambique that is predominantly Christian. Sadly, there are tensions and conflicts between different ethnic and faith groups. Before Radio Wimbe started broadcasting, people in the local community felt they had very little say in the issues which have an impact on their lives and wellbeing. With illiteracy very high and most people in Pemba unable to speak the national language, Portuguese, many have been excluded from listening or engaging with the country's national media. Please pray for the team at Radio Wimbe, who face many challenges when interacting with listeners (150,000) each day, in the local language.



Loaves and Fishes

We have recently changed our referral process in order to help people out of debt, maximise their income and reduce

dependency. We now only accept referrals from partner agencies who have some knowledge of the financial circumstances of families so that families are directed towards other sources of help as well, such as debt counselling and benefit maximising. This is working well, especially with CAB and West Kent Housing. Other agencies such as schools, churches, health centres, are now asked to signpost families to any one of the partner agencies. We still provide emergency food so that no-one is refused help but we do ask the recipient to seek a referral in order to receive on going help, if that is required.
